Christ Church Primary School PE and Sport Vision Statement

At Christ Church Primary School, we believe that Physical Education and Sport play a vital role in the physical, social, emotional and intellectual development of children. Physical Education and sport are central in giving children the knowledge and understanding in order to make a positive impact on their own health and well-being. The physical education curriculum at Christ Church aims to provide children with the opportunity to take part in a range of sports and physical activities, carried out in a safe and supportive environment, where “everyone can succeed”

National Curriculum Aims

- Competent pupils able to excel in a broad range of physical activities
- Pupils have the ability to be physically active for sustained periods of time
- Pupils to be able to engage in competitive sports and activities
- Pupils to be supported to lead healthy and active lifestyles
- Pupils have the opportunity to be involved in sports leadership

Sports Premium 2024/25

The primary ‘sport premium’ funding for primary schools has been designed to help schools in a variety of ways. Some of the outcomes we hope to meet through the ‘sport premium’ are:

- Improvements in the quality and breadth of PE and sporting provision, including ‘increasing participation in PE and sport so that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of’
- Improved quality of teaching and learning in primary physical education, including more dynamic and sustained exercise in lessons
- Increased opportunities for competitive sport
- Increased sports leadership for pupils
- Develop the range of sporting activities offered
- Foster links with local sporting clubs

How the Sports Premium is being used at Christ Church (July 2025) and the impact for the school.

During the current financial year, we spent £20,671.16. £1800 was spent on rejoining the East Staffs Sports Partnership – this enables us to take part in lots of after-school competitions (please see the school’s X page), support for PE lessons in school and CPD for staff - £390 was spent on dance workshops for the whole school and was a great aid for staff in the teaching of dance. This has enabled staff to feel more confident in the teaching of dance and was seen in lesson observations.

£3,630 pounds was spent on repairs/maintenance in line with the school’s health and safety policy. This allows all our children to take part in PE lessons and playtimes/lunchtimes safely.

One of our major drivers was to increase the amount of exercise our children were involved in at playtime/lunchtimes. In order to achieve this, we purchased outdoor gym/climbing equipment at the cost of £9105.45. This was installed in October. The impact of having this equipment installed

has been huge with a big increase in the number of children being involved in healthy exercise at playtimes/lunchtimes.

We also spent £1190 on after school clubs run by Burton Albion. This has had great impact for lots of children at our school – there have been clubs for reception to Y6. We monitor carefully all the children that attend the Burton Albion after school clubs ensuring all children have access to the clubs, particularly our pupil premium children. These clubs included Burton Wildcats which focusses on girls' football – all our girls from Y1-Y6 have had the opportunity to take part in these clubs. It has increased the number of girls playing football, particularly at playtimes. Our Y5/6 girls football team helped to inspire this by qualifying to represent Burton Albion at the East Midlands Regional Finals back in March.

We have also invested £180 pounds to attend the termly PE network meetings which have a real impact on the development of our PE teaching and curriculum initiatives. In addition, we have invested £339.16 on new PE equipment/kit for after school competitions based on staff recommendations.

Based on government requirements for all children to swim 25m by the end of Y6, we invested £1211 in the summer term into extra swimming lessons for our Y4 and a group of Y3 children. The number of current Y6 pupils meeting the national curriculum requirement to swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25m is 29/45 (64% up from 60.86% in 23/24); using a range of strokes effectively is 26/45 (58% up from 56.52% in 2023/24) and performing safe self-rescue in different water-based situations is 22/45 (49% up from 47.82%) for the 2024-25 academic year.

In the new financial year (starting April 2025) we have budgeted for catch up swimming once again for the summer term (£2115). We have also contracted AM sports (£945) to replace Burton Albion for a lunchtime club/curriculum time support/after school club. This is taking place on Wednesday afternoons. We hope this will enable more children to improve the amount of exercise they have, help with team building skills and provide a wider range of after school activities. We have also invested some more money in equipment to improve the quality of PE lessons.

Sports Premium Success at Christ Church

Since changing status from an Infant school to a Primary in 2013 Christ Church has had tremendous success in local competitions thanks to the Sports Premium Grant. We have been able to provide quality lessons, equipment and coaching from both internal and external staff. Up until July 2024, our achievements include:

Swimming Outcomes 2024-25

All Y3 and Y4 children attended swimming lessons at the Meadowside Leisure Centre since September 2024 and were taught by swimming teachers in differentiated groups. Travel to the pool and the cost of lessons is paid for by the school. As previously mentioned extra swimming lessons for our Y4 and a group of Y3 children took place in the summer term which came out of the Sports Premium budget.

The number of current Y6 pupils meeting the national curriculum requirement to swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25m is 29/45 (64%); using a range of strokes effectively is 26/45 (58%) and performing safe self-rescue in different water-based situations is 22/45 (49%) for the 2024-25 academic year.

Reporting

The Headteacher will report to governors on the impact of sports funding annually and the report will be on the school website for parents to view.
